Pough, 2015-12-01 Hip hop culture began in the early 1970s as the creative and activist expressions graffiti writing dee jaying break dancing and rap music of black and Latino youth in the depressed South Bronx and the movement has since grown into a worldwide cultural phenomenon that permeates almost every aspect of society from speech to dress But although hip hop has been assimilated and exploited in
