What is Thinking?

Thinking: The mental manipulation of representations of information we encounter in our environments.

Cognitive psychologists study thought and the understanding that results from thinking

What are Mental Representations?

- Analogical representations: Mental representations that have some of the physical characteristics of objects
- Symbolic representations: Abstract mental representations that consist of words or ideas

Mental Maps include both analogical and symbolic representations

Such shortcuts are useful, but they can sometimes lead to errors, because we can represent only
a limited range of knowledge.

Schemes Are the Basis of Thinking

Schemes allow categorization of concept

- Schemas: Mental structures—collect ideas, prior knowledge, and experience that help organize information and thought and behavior.
- · Schemes form as the result of your experiences

When we use a schema to group things based on shared properties, we create a category.

Concept: A mental representation of objects, events, or relations organized around common themes. Exemplar model of categorization

- Exemplar model: A way of thinking about concepts. All concepts in a category are examples (exemplars); together, they form the category
- Prototype model: A way of thinking about concepts. Within each category, there is a best example—a prototype—for that category.

Stere-otypes

 Schemes that allow for easy, fast processing of information about people, events, or groups, based on their membership in particular groups

Examples:

- Race: Black, White, Asian
- Role: Professor, athlete, mortician
- · Gender: Male, female, nonbinary

You Use Thinking in Three Ways

Reasoning: Using information to determine if a conclusion is valid or reasonable.

- Informal reasoning: relying on opinions
- Formal reasoning: relying on logical and objective methods

Biased Reasoning

- Confirmation bias: people show a strong tendency to pay greater attention to evidence that supports their beliefs and ignore or downplay evidence that does not
- Sulflow and colleagues (2019) found that visual attention to news stories on Facebook did not vary by attitude held, but stories selected did
